Thursday, June 20th marked the final session of the 2023-2024 Chamber Leadership Program. Late July or early August we will be celebrating the completion of all ten session with THIRTY graduates (date to be announced soon).

The purpose of the Chamber Leadership Program is to increase the quality and quantity of individuals capable of accepting leadership roles within their organization as well as the communities they work and live

The curriculum consists of meeting one date per month, typically the third Thursday, for a ten-month period. Most sessions begin around 8:00 a.m. and conclude around 4:00 p.m. Participants are required to attend all sessions in their entirety in order to graduate (two additional years given to make up missed sessions). Classes are exposed to the variety of civic and economic resources and issues of our area. Topics covered are: Leadership Development; History, Geography and People of Shelby County; Economic Development; Law Enforcement, Fire and Rescue; Media; Human Services; Education; Health Services; City and County Government; Agriculture.

interrupted your thought and you'll have to revisit what yo were doing. You may not have the luxury of silencing th phone at your business, but you can silence e-notification No, really. You can. You'll survive. Set your devices to go i and out of Do Not Disturb throughout the day or giv yourself designated 30-60 minute work sprints followed by I -15 minute times to answer those emails or texts. There ar very few electronic communications that can't wait one hou for a response. If you're worried you'll miss a custome communication and thus a sales opportunity, look into # chatbot options or hire a message service. But do this only you're in a business where waiting 60 minutes is th difference between life or death (and even so, most doctor will tell callers that they should call the ER if it's life-threatening emergency). Most situations can wai Silencing notifications means you get your to-do list finishe in a fraction of the time and with a much better, mor focused quality. That focus yields better outcomes. Giv yourself the gift of time by silencing those notifications.

Decide on Your Most Important Tasks and Keep List. If you're silencing notifications, you should have 30-6 minutes of limited interruptions. If you work behind counter, in a brick-and-mortar business you will still hav those interruptions but here's how you will make the most c your day. You need two lists. The first list is comprised of 2-things that will make the biggest impact on your busines TODAY. They are your short-term wins. They'll move th needle quickly. The second list is comprised of the things yo can chip away at. They're important but they're long-terr goals or tasks that are not time sensitive. They could be quic



wins or long undertakings but they're things you can work on when you have a spare "minute or two". As a business owner, you will always have unexpected time-waiting for a meeting or on a vendor, a slow moment at the store, you get the idea. Make a list of things you can do during that time that will impact your business. For example, use Al to brainstorm a new name for the newsletter. Look for a new color scheme (if considering a rebrand.) Watch a video on YouTube on something you want to learn more about like digital marketing. Most of the time when we have these stolen moments, we don't maximize them. We go on to Facebook and remark about how big our friends' kids are getting.

While heartwarming, this is not a great use of time. Instead, make this list and keep it handy (store it on your phone so you'll have it wherever you are.) That way you can use your stolen moments for the greatest impact.

Fill Your Attentional Load. If you are working on mundane tasks that don't require a lot of thinking, you may find you're more easily distracted. Using music or other intentional distractors that you control can actually help you stay focused because it "fills" the part of your brain that requires stimulation. This action works in much the same way that a sail may flap in the wind with small gusts but larger gusts that fill it will keep it pulled tight with less flapping around. Sometimes it's the little things.
